### He Speaks and Feels the Language

Jeanette Peterson, Ed.D. Candidate, Northern Arizona University

The Quechan Tribe is a Federally recognized tribe in the Southwestern United States. There are less than 100 fluent speakers placing Quechan in an Endangered language status. This presentation discusses the ongoing ethnographic study of an adult Quechan language learner and the unique factors involved in his success.
