Since retiring in 2004, she has worked with educators in many urban school districts, and continues to collaborate with the Council of Great City Schools to improve academic language and literacy instruction for English learners. Bio: Kathy Escamilla is a Professor of Education in the Division of Educational Equity and Cultural Diversity at the University of Colorado, Boulder. She holds the Bob & Judy Charles Endowed Chair of Education. She received her Ph.D. from the University of California, Los Angeles. Dr. Escamilla's research centers on educational issues related to Spanish speaking emerging bilingual students in U.S. schools. She is specifically interested in issues related to the development of bilingualism and biliteracy in early elementary grades. Her recent research has also examined assessment practices and the impact of high stakes testing on these children.



Her most recent research project titled, "Literacy Squared" has established the benefits of paired literacy in Spanish and English for emerging bilingual children. Dr. Escamilla is a member of numerous professional organizations in education and has served two terms as the president of the National Association for Bilingual Education. She has served the co-editor of the Bilingual Research Journal, and has served as the chairperson of the Bilingual SIG for the American Education Research Association (AERA). She has published three books and over 50 articles in research journals.



Bio: Drs. Wayne Thomas and Virginia Collier are internationally known for their research on long-term school effectiveness for linguistically and culturally diverse students. Dr. Thomas is a professor emeritus of evaluation and research methodology, and Dr. Collier is a professor emerita of bilingual/multicultural/ESL education, both of George Mason University.

### WIDA Session: Language Development in Dual Language Program

This hands-on, bilingual session presents an introductory overview of the WIDA Spanish Language Development Framework by drawing from literature on bilingualism, biliteracy, and multicultural education. To engage participants, facilitators use PowerPoint, handouts, and opportunities for partner and small group work. Interactive activities encourage participants to critically reflect on the teaching and learning of Spanish in their local contexts, and to identify ways in which the presented Spanish language resources can be infused into their daily practice.

### **Learning Objectives:**

- I. Participants will explore the construct of Spanish for academic purposes within the context of U.S. schooling, and the diverse linguistic repertoires enacted by emergent bilingual children and youth.
- 2. Participants will explore the components of the WIDA Spanish Language Development Framework and discuss how these components can be used to promote an asset-based approach to Spanish language teaching and learning in a variety of program types.
- 3. Participants will identify and discuss ways the WIDA Spanish Language Development Framework components can be implemented in their local contexts.

This asset-based approach to the teaching and learning of Spanish in the U.S. challenges pervasive deficit views of Spanish bilinguals that exist in our educational system. By promoting the value of the diverse Spanish language varieties students bring to school, we hope to promote stronger advocacy for emergent bilinguals and their unique language learning experiences and needs. This presentation can also help inform how bilingual educators approach the design of instruction and assessment, and how they interpret students' progress towards bilingualism/biliteracy.

Bio: Mariana Castro, Ph.D. is Director of Standards for WIDA at the Wisconsin Center for Education Research, University of Wisconsin- Madison. Mariana is, foremost, an educator, having worked for over 16 years in K-12 public education. Over the last eleven years, Mariana has worked with pre-service and in-service teachers and administrators across the US and abroad with a focus on multilingual development. She has also presented at national and international conferences, authored various publications and served the field through her work as an expert in various national policy projects. Mariana has also participated in the development of a variety of standards, including WIDA English Language Development Standards, K-12; WIDA Spanish Language Development Standards for children 2.5 through 5.5 years old, in English and Spanish. She has also served as Principal Investigator for a variety of grants and research related to early language development, English language development, Spanish language development, data literacy, and family engagement. Mariana's research interests also include translanguaging and social justice in education.

**Bio:** Alissa Blair is an Assistant Researcher at the Wisconsin Center for Education Research at the University of Wisconsin-Madison where she collaborates with WIDA on research and development initiatives related to English language development, Spanish language development, and family engagement. Alissa's research interests include language use in and out of school, family engagement, and qualitative inquiry. Her work has appeared in Linguistics and Education, Critical Inquiry in Language Education, and Review of Research in Education, among others. She has teaching experience at the elementary, high school, and college levels. ### Transformative Leadership Practices in Dual Language Education

This institute focuses on transformative dual language shared leadership practices at the district and school levels that facilitate effective program planning, implementation, enhancement, and sustainability. The session begins with current trends and benefits of dual language education followed by a discussion of the challenges and potential pressure points of program implementation and expansion.

The session shifts to leadership practices that help to create district-wide long-term commitment to dual language education by developing strategic plans, establishing school-based leadership teams, building coordinator leadership skills and teacher expertise, and formulating dual language mission statements. Networking leadership systems such as dual language Principal Consortiums also serve to support collaborative problem-solving efforts to address challenges include: authentic target language instructional materials and technology; program expansion to high school and beyond; Seal of Biliteracy integration and pathways recognitions; building district administrator knowledge and support; strategic use of funding and resources; language assessments; and alignment of curricular and assessment policies to dual language education. The session also includes a number of suggested protocols for program planning and evaluation.

Bio: Dr. Sonia W. Soltero received her PhD from the University of Arizona and is Associate Professor and Chair of the Department of Leadership, Language, and Curriculum as well as the Coordinator of the Doctorate Program at DePaul University. She is the author of multiple articles, book chapters, guidebooks, and three books: Dual Language Education: Program Design and Implementation, Schoolwide Approaches to Educating ELLs: Creating Linguistically and Culturally Responsive K-12 Schools, and Dual Language: Teaching and Learning in Two Languages. Soltero has been involved in dual and bilingual education for thirty years as a dual language teacher, university professor, professional developer, and researcher. Soltero has extensive experience collaborating with PK-12 districts across the US as well as the first of its kind dual language university, on design and implementation of dual language and bilingual programs.

### Dr. Cristina Alfaro, San Diego State University

A Critical Examination of the Three Pillars—New Guiding Principles of Dual Language Education: Instituting a Plan Toward Access and Equity

While Dual Language Education (DLE) programs offer new spaces for the affirmation of the bilingualism of Latino children, it is incumbent upon educators, at all levels, to address the power hierarchies between low-income Latino communities and White middle-class communities that are being served by these programs. In this session, participants will have the opportunity to review the Three Pillars within the Guiding Principles of DLE to critically examine and connect the ideological, pedagogical, access, and equity dimensions in establishing linguistic and cultural democracy in dual language learning spaces.

Bio: Dr. Cristina Alfaro, is Professor and Chair of the Dual Language and English Learner Education Department in the College of Education at San Diego State University. Dr. Alfaro leads the largest bilingual teacher credential program in the state of California. Additionally, she is the director of a Binational Teacher Education Project (Mexico/California) that addresses the educational demands of the "Students We Share." She has over two decades of experience in directing both local and international bilingual teacher education programs in California, Mexico, and Europe. She also serves on the board of the California Association for Bilingual Educators (CABE) as the Director of Secondary Education and Institutions of Higher Education Affairs.

Dr. Alfaro is the recipient of the San Diego County Office of Education Biliteracy Leadership Award, College of Education Excellence in Teaching Award, and the Outstanding Latina in Higher Education Award. Her background as a biliteracy teacher, school administrator, and Bilingual Teacher Education Department Chair have served her well in providing professional development for school principals, teachers, families, and communities in developing and implementing Dual Language Education Programs with access and equity at the core--within a socio-political and cultural context.

As a researcher she has examined and published on the role of teachers' pedagogical and ideological clarity related to teaching practices for bilingual learners--with a call to situate equity in Dual Language Education within broader efforts to combat the racialization of Latinx and other minoritized communities. Her publications have been featured in a variety of peer-reviewed journals and edited books. She presents on these topics at local, state, national, and international education conferences.

A universal walkthrough system will be shared that aligns with all English proficiency standards currently in use in most states. Of particular interest will be a method for administrators to use when analyzing English learner data based upon the relationship between their state required assessment and their English language proficiency assessment. Participants will receive a handout that will help them implement T.E.A.M. in their schools and districts.

### Bio: John Seidlitz

John Seidlitz is an independent educational consultant and the author of Sheltered Instruction Plus: A Guide for Texas Teachers of English Learners; Navigating the ELPS: Using the New Standards to Improve Instruction for English Learners; and a contributing author for The SIOP® Model for Teaching History-Social Studies for English Learners.

He is the co-author of numerous publications including the 7 Steps to Developing a Language-Rich Interactive Classroom® and ELLs in Texas: What Administrators Need to Know. 



# Presented to: **Dr. Joel Gómez**

Dr. Joel Gómez is the President and Chief Executive Office for the Center for Applied Linguistics. He holds an Ed.D. in Higher Education Administration from The George Washington University. He received his M.A. in Latin American Studies from the University of Texas at Austin, where he also completed doctoral work in Applied Linguistics and Foreign Language Education Studies. He received a B.A. in Liberal Arts (Spanish and History) from the University of Texas at Austin.

With a proven management style that empowers and motivates, Gómez brings a wide range of experience in research, policy, and practice in equity, language and education to CAL from his work in higher education, the private, for-profit sector, and public education.

Dr. Gómez joined CAL from the George Washington University (GW) where he held a joint appointment as a faculty member and Chair of the Department of Education Leadership and where he also served as Associate Dean for Research for the Graduate School of Education and Human Development. Dr. Gómez's areas of expertise include bilingual and bicultural education, higher education, national online information centers, and federal funding of education research and development. He has also worked at the international level as an evaluator and technical assistance provider in countries such as India, Pakistan, Macedonia, Dominican Republic, among others.

Before GW, Gómez served as vice president for computer and clearinghouse operations in a small, for-profit business, as well as project director on sponsored projects. As vice president, he assisted in competing for and supporting a variety of information clearinghouse sponsored projects, including the National Clearinghouse for Bilingual Education, among others.

Gómez began his career in education by teaching at the middle school and elementary grades. In this capacity, he taught first, second, and sixth grades in two school districts in South Texas. Following his elementary school teaching experience, Gómez taught undergraduate courses in the Department of Romance Languages at Pan American University (UTRGV), where he taught beginning Spanish courses for Spanish-speakers along with courses in peninsular and Latin American literature and Spanish applied linguistics.

Gómez has served as President and Treasurer of the National Association of Bilingual Education, and is a founding member of the Mexican and American Solidarity Foundation, a multi-million entity funded by the government of Mexico.

Following his time at Pan American University, Gómez worked at the Texas Education Service Center (XIII), where he lead various efforts, including serving as director of federal programs in Title I, Migrant Education, and bilingual education. Related to these efforts, he also served as regional director for a national Spanish curriculum development project (language arts, social sciences, math, science, and fine arts); director of a tri-state education technical assistance center; and, director for a national assessment and curriculum project in bilingual education.




### Being Enye - Presented by Denise Soler Cox





This prestigious NABE award honors individuals/organizations that have made a significant contribution to the field of bilingual/global education leading to the improvement of educational equity and access for bilingual/multilingual students.

Silvia Dorta-Duque de Reyes recently served as Expert Panel Member for the development of the California ELD Standards and subsequently as Curriculum Framework and Evaluation Criteria Committee Member for the California State Department of Education.

She is well known for her contributions in the areas of curriculum design, English Language Arts, English Language Development, Spanish Language Arts, Staff development and Parent Involvement.

Her area of expertise is biliteracy with a focus on academic writing and the organization of instruction for explicit teaching of Spanish to English cross-linguistic transfer.

In collaboration with the CCSSO and the California Department of Education, Silvia coordinated the Spanish translation and linguistic augmentation of the Common Core State Standards for Language Arts and Mathematics.

He has fought to ensure access to health care for all families, advocated for smart growth policies, pushed for permanent investments in early childhood education, and fought tirelessly to protect civil rights for all.

As an active member of Democratic Ward IIA, Javier has laid deep roots in the district. For over fifteen years, Javier has demonstrated his commitment to social justice and has taken innovative and transformative ideas to the New Mexico State Legislature, where he serves as a Representative from District II.

**Dr. Flores's** outstanding contributions to the advancement of the field of education can be better described as transformative scholarship. Numerous individuals can attest to ways in which her work has opened doors and access to opportunities.

Under Dr. Flores leadership, the Academy for Teacher Excellence has (I) recruited, retained, and supported over 400 undergraduate teacher candidates, with majority being Latino women; (2) provided induction support to over 150 novice teachers; and (3) recruited, supported, retained, and certified 102 graduate students in math, science, and special education (80% women and 50% Latinos working with about 7,500 low income, minority high school students).


In addition to student support, ATE has funded 42 faculty research projects totaling \$138,000, funded 3 doctoral student fellowships totaling \$55,000, supported 6 graduate assistants totaling \$80,000, and sponsored 30 professional development seminars providing \$18,000 in faculty stipends.

ATE E3 goals are to increase minority student access to education through the use of technology; to date the project has supplied over 200 students and 50 faculty with iPhones and netbooks as educational and instructional tools.






In 2014, New Mexico passed a law designating a statewide seal of bilingualism and biliteracy.


### Proud to be bilingual Orgullosa de ser Bilingüe

### "Navegar en el océano"



## **Nancy Alatorre**

My experience in education has been a journey. A journey that began 28 years ago as I arrived in this country as an undocumented child who was brought to the United States with the promise of a brighter future. I entered a whole new world, foreign in every sense of the word. Everything seemed so overwhelming, I felt invisible, incapable and lonely. The way I envision my childhood during that time is as a spectator of one of those silent movies in which actions and motions show me what is going on, but inside I felt lost and afraid. This sensation that was further exacerbated by the fact that I left a home full of life in Mexico and came to a house where I left for school every morning on my own, and came home to an empty house due to my mother's work schedule.

However, it was through perseverance and thanks to role models that I encountered along the way, that I began to incorporate myself into my new reality and began not only to learn the language but the societal rules as well. It wasn't until my sixth grade year in school that I really started feeling part of my classroom. I felt that my teacher really appreciated me and made a conscious effort to include me in classroom activities. Activities that back then were intended and planned for native speakers, as the English Learners sat at the kidney bean table at the back of the class, working in small groups with the aide. However, this particular teacher made a difference, she made me challenge myself so that I could participate with the class and helped me gain the confidence that I needed in order to feel capable of excelling in school. It was through her encouragement and support that I began believing in myself and started coming out of my shell. By the end of sixth grade, I was reclassified and exited the English Learner program. Many of my friends were not so fortunate and I saw how much they struggled and eventually ended up dropping out of school. It is why my sixth grade teacher became one of my role models; it was then that I really began thinking about how amazing it would be to become a teacher.

I made it through Middle School and High School with some good experiences and some not so good. Even though I did well in school I never really felt that my goal was college. I wanted to go and I thought it would be wonderful, but I didn't see it in my future and it definitely didn't seem within my reach. My family is very hard working, but I had a feeling that they would have been content if I had just graduated from High School. I went through all the motions and did my university project, researched a college and found out what it would take for me to go there, but deep inside I still didn't believe I could do it. Besides, I didn't have an example to follow; all my older cousins had dropped out of school and or had entry level jobs at a young age. By my senior year I was already married and had a part time job at the same company where my mother had been working for over 10 years.

It wasn't until the second semester of my senior year that I felt inspired once again. I took a creative writing class that I really enjoyed. My teacher continuously praised my writing and told me about how she had shared my writing with the members of her church and told me that they really enjoyed it. It was that year in April, during my English class when some students were being dismissed to go meet with a community college representative, that I took the initiative and asked for permission to go and meet with a representative as well. I told my teacher that I had not signed up, she encouraged me to go anyway. What I felt when I left the conference room that afternoon was surreal. I had completed a college application, two months before graduating from High School. I finally knew for certain that I was going to college, At that point it took me about two seconds to decide that I was going to become a teacher.

College after that was doable, I took it one step at a time. I was married, worked and had a baby at age twenty. However, by then I see that I had already overcome the biggest obstacle, my insecurities and not believing in myself. I went to LA Harbor Community College where I obtained my AA Degree. I also began to gain some experience in a school setting by becoming a substitute aide for the childcare centers in my community. I was able to work closely with many wonderful people who helped me, gave me advice and taught me invaluable things that I would later use in my teaching profession. I then transferred to Cal State Dominguez Hills and graduated Magna Cum Laude. I obtained my Bachelor's Degree in Liberal Studies and a minor in Spanish in addition to my BCLAD.

I was one of the fortunate few to be offered a teaching position with LAUSD before I finished with my credential program. I had several job offers, and began teaching a month after completing the credential program. I worked for LAUSD and had a successful year, thanks to the supporting staff that helped me every step of the way. After a year, my husband got offered a job in Palmdale and it was then that I left LAUSD and came to Palmdale.

In Palmdale, I began working in 2007 as a 5th grade teacher at a monolingual school. After a few years working there that the idea of teaching in Spanish at a bilingual school intrigued me once again. I investigated the program and I wanted my own children to attend and take advantage of the opportunity of learning in their native language as well as in English. I began working at Los Amigos Dual Immersion School and it is now my second home.

I believe that our experiences prepare us for greater things in life. My life experiences as a minority and as an English Leamer prepared me in becoming the teacher that I am today. I see it as my duty and goal in life to teach and empower all of my students so that they come to a realization early in their lives that two languages are truly better than one and to remind them that they don't have to leave their home language and their culture behind to succeed. Texturing with multimodal texts across content areas: A translanguaging multiliteracies approach to teaching and learning

In a case study of a third-grade bilingual classroom, this research aims to demonstrate the ways in which a bilingual educator and her emergent bilingual students interact—and engage with—multimodal texts (e.g., visual, audio, spatial, and/or behavioral texts) in the science, social studies, and language arts curricula. The literacy events, literacy practices, and navigation of multimodal texts within and across content areas were analyzed using multiliteracies and translanguaging theoretical frameworks. The findings suggest that: (I) the supplementation of multimodal texts prompted authentic student engagement and flexible ways of teaching and learning in the bilingual classroom; and (2) the design, production, and distribution of new texts are key in promoting language development and gaining disciplinary knowledge. Together, the findings highlight a classroom that affords emergent bilinguals the use of dynamic linguistic and literacy practices in content area instruction. In light of this, I propose a translanguaging multiliteracies pedagogical approach for teaching and learning.

## An Ethnographic Case Study: The Co-Construction Of Mathematical Knowledge In a 4TH Grade Dual Language Classroom

This study examined how teacher and students co-constructed mathematical understanding in a 4th grade dual language classroom. In other words, I observed how the students and teacher made meaning of the mathematical content. I wanted to learn how teacher and students communicated mathematically and bilingually, especially at 4th grade where students received their entire mathematics lesson in English for the first time in a two-way dual language setting. Both teacher and students' previous learning experiences were examined in order to have insight into their participation during classroom interactions. The classroom observations and interviews revealed that both teacher and students used both English and Spanish to communicate mathematically in order to make meaning. Other strategies used included nonlinguistic representations of the concepts, such as hand gestures and drawings. This study supports using language as a resource (Ruiz, 1984).

#### Bilingual Latino Middle Schoolers on Languaging and Racialization in the US

This dissertation explores bilingual Latino middle schoolers' articulated understandings of their language practices as well as the links between language practices and processes of racialization and discrimination in the US. The research was conducted in the context of an afterschool program whose explicit aim was to not only document students' experiences, but to use those experiences as a basis for generating individual and collective critical understandings among participants. The findings of this case study center on the ways youth understand processes of racialization, translanguaging, and translation in the context of an English dominant society, and how these understandings are connected to larger processes of discrimination and oppression, as well as resistance. The dissertation concludes by suggesting the need to center our understandings of bilingualism as well as language advocacy work on the lived experiences of bilingual youth and their communities. My hope is that this study will illuminate new possibilities for engaging with young adolescents in ways that foreground youth's voices and experiences, generate opportunities for critical dialogue, and inspire social transformation.



Nevertheless, the result of this study based on community fieldwork reveals that we still find bilingual teenagers in this community.



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
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
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
